Study away cover a broad range of activities. You may travel with a faculty member and other students to learn about various topics as seen through the lens of another country. You may also complete a study away on your own and request credit for that activity. In both cases, you experience other cultures and learn about your culture at the same time. As such, we allow students to use a study away experience to count up to three hours in the Cultural Competence requirement in General Education.

It's obvious--visiting another country and being immersed in another culture is its own benefit. It's that immersive experience that allows you to learn in action and get college credit towards your degree requirements. You will expand your view of the world as a result of this experience.

Because one of our pillars is Cultural Competence, completing a study away program gives you the chance to experience that pillar in action. It's an immersive learning experience that benefits any student who wants to challenge themselves and learn deeply about another culture.
