



Completion Student Spotlight

Inspired by a 21-year-old CRNA in the Navy, Yearty began her uphill climb.

With a DNAP program not available in North Carolina, Sharon Yearty searched out-of-state and is thankful to have found Missouri State.

Yearty, a southern girl all her life, obtained her first degree in medical technology, and while in the Navy, she worked as a surgical assistant in an oral surgery office.


Yearty found herself inspired by a 21-year-old nurse anesthetist, named Lynn, that worked in the same office. She describes Lynn's work as "pure magic".

Yearty continued to work and gave up on her dreams of pursuing nursing and anesthesia. She ran an all-consuming family business and it wasn't until her husband was badly injured, she decided to recoup and start over. Yearty describes the moment as a blessing, "in such an ugly disguise!".

She went on to graduate with her AND, BSN, and then started Master's classes while working her first ICU position. She attended Anesthesia School at UNC-Charlotte and Carolinas Medical Center School of Nurse Anesthesia. With an injured husband, a long commute, three teenage daughters, and a full-time ICU position, Yearty was determined to become a CRNA.

Yearty recalls how inspired she was by Lynn, the CRNA in the oral surgery office.

"I did not fully appreciate the magnitude of her expertise until I went to anesthesia school. In 1973, she did room-air general anesthetics with no oxygen, no monitors of any kind, expertly delivered tiny boluses of pentothal, and no post-op monitoring...absolutely hair raising," Yearty exclaims.


Akinwande describes her first year as "difficult, stressful, and at times overwhelming. But, looking back on it now, it was not that bad!"



Research

PROJECT

A new research project has been initiated by Dr. Aurentz and Dr. Skibiski this summer.

Working in collaboration with the Missouri Nurses Association and the Missouri Board of Nursing, they will be looking at the effect of COVID on APRN practice in Missouri.

The research question is whether the waivers issued by Missouri Governor Parsons had any effect on the practices of Advanced Practice Nurses.

A positive effect of easing the practice restrictions will be useful for future advocacy for the four advanced practice nursing specialties.

CURRICULAR UPDATE

Greetings MSU School of Anesthesia students and alumni!



I would like to share with you some of the exciting new curricular changes happening here at MSU.

Each year, we review our didactic program and assess any changes that need to be made to improve student performance. We carefully sift through student evaluations and grades, and evaluate scores and pass rates on the National Self Evaluation Exam (SEE) and the National Certifying Exam (NCE). In addition to reporting as pass/ not pass, the exams also break student scores down into four didactic categories. These include Basic Sciences (and pharmacology); Equipment, Instrumentation and Technology; General Principles of Anesthesia; and Anesthesia for Surgical Procedures and Special Populations. The scores obtained from the SEE can be extremely helpful in helping students know where to focus their efforts in preparing for the national board examination. Also, as graduating students take the NCE, faculty are able to evaluate scores in each of the categories and see where improvements could be focused.

One of the exciting new changes we have made in our curriculum is our ANE 721 Anesthesia Equipment and Physics class. Two years ago, faculty noticed that this was an area that could benefit from greater focus. The content required for these areas had previously been included in multiple classes. As this was an area of great interest to me, I went about

developing the class and began the pilot class in the fall of 2018.

The syllabus and content taught exactly follow the NBCRNA outline for the board content for this section of the NCE. This section accounts for 18% of SEE content and 15% of NCE content. The class includes an in-depth study of the anesthesia machine, gas laws, airway equipment, fire and electrical safety, and all other equipment used in anesthesia. The students have been extremely receptive and can readily see the value of spending additional time and focus on content that will match so specifically to what they need to know for clinical practice and for testing. The new class was repeated in the fall of 2019 and student reviews have been good. We are looking forward to tracking the results and determining the effectiveness as graduating students take the NCE. Always looking for ways to make sure our students remain the best!
