SPS – WHAT IS MEASURED?

- No. of students who take the ACT Exam
- ACT College Readiness Benchmark
 Scores
- Drop Out Rate
- Graduation Rate

SPS – WHAT IS MEASURED?

- 1006 students take the ACT
- 40 African American (the district averages 500 African American high school students)
- 8 American Indian
- 804 Caucasian
- 44 Hispanic
- 27 Asian American
- 2 Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander
- 51 Two or more races and 30 did not respond



DRURY SCHOLARS PRIMARY GOAL

CLOSE THE RACIAL ACIEHVEMENT GAP



- Build strong relationships between and among students:
 - Relationships with peers
 - Relationships with African American college students who serve as mentors, teachers and role models
 - Relationships with adults, including DUSP staff (Drury faculty, Program Coordinator and volunteers)



- Setting high academic expectations for students:
 - ACT prep courses
 - ACT practice tests
 - Self-directed academic goal setting, including GPA



Mentors play several roles:

- Help students set goals
- Follow through with students to see if they are making progress on their goals
- •Develop relationships characterized by caring and trust, patience and understanding the heart and soul of our work.



Developing Strong Peer-to-Peer Relationships

Students who develop strong friendships with other students committed to academic success are more likely to succeed in college.



Experiencing a College Campus

Students who have positive experiences on a college campus are more likely to go to college.



Enrolling in College Prep Courses

Students who take a rigorous high school curriculum are more likely to go to and succeed in college.

- Year Round Program:
 Middle School Once a
 Week & High School –
 Once A Week and Once a
 Month
- Middle School Program –
 One Day in May
- Summer Program One Week in July



HOW THE PROGRAM WORKS?

- Weekly Mentoring and Tutoring Sessions
- Regular Outings and Trips
- University & College Tours
- Community Service
- Educational, Cultural and Social Events



HOW ARE WE DOING?

- 149 students attended college tours
- 20 students attended Infinite Scholars
- 28 college applications seven seniors accepted at colleges of their choice
- 17 of our students took the ACT exam almost half increased their score by three points.
- Four seniors in the yearlong program will receive academic scholarships.



HOW TO START A SCHOLARS PROGRAM

- Identify the need
- Start small
- Determine focus
- Develop performance measures
- Connect need to WIIFM in the community for additional support



ONGOING CHALLENGES

- Funding if the program grows
- Resources for one-on-one mentoring
- Tutors
