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***How do you describe the course to students when they ask “What is this class about?” (Without using the catalog description)?***

REL 101 introduces students to the literature, history, and religion of ancient Israel, as preserved in the Old Testament (“Hebrew Bible”). The course leads students through readings within the context of the ancient Near Eastern world, revealed in part through archaeological discovery. The ideas and stories within the Hebrew Bible share all that constitute the human experience in all cultures and times. This encounter with the biblical text and the ideas within should develop creative approaches to examine the world, expanded capacities to understand new cultures and ideas, and increased potential for successful, ethical, and responsible citizenship.

Students can understand how the text of the OT/HB contributed to the knowledge and experiences of the ancient Hebrews, as well as to its continued influences on Western culture.

Students will be introduced to various critical and theoretical methods to study and analyze the text and how it continues to impact modern society

Students will appreciate texts as products of an ancient cultures, and begin to identify and master relevant contextual elements and traditions through archaeology and socio-historical study
