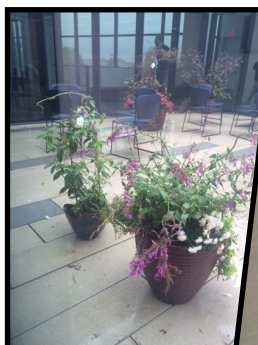

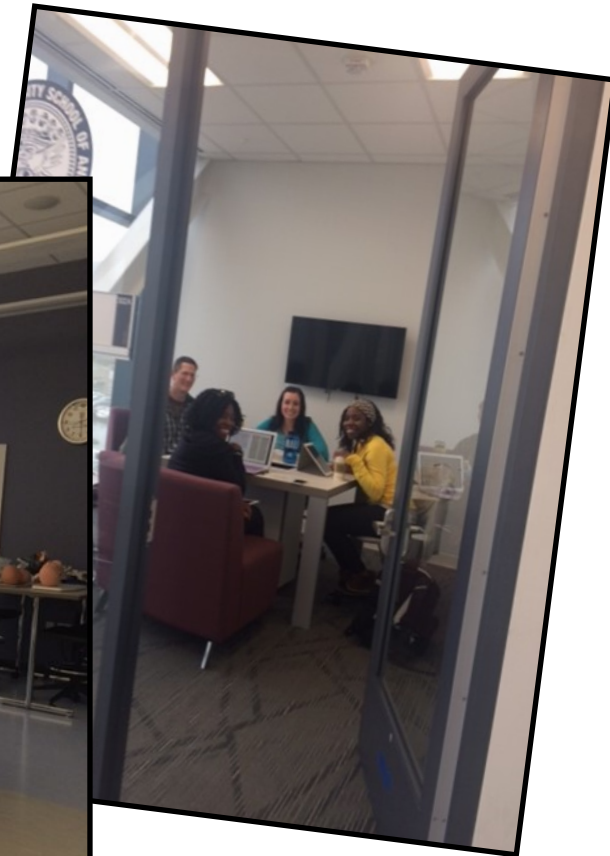
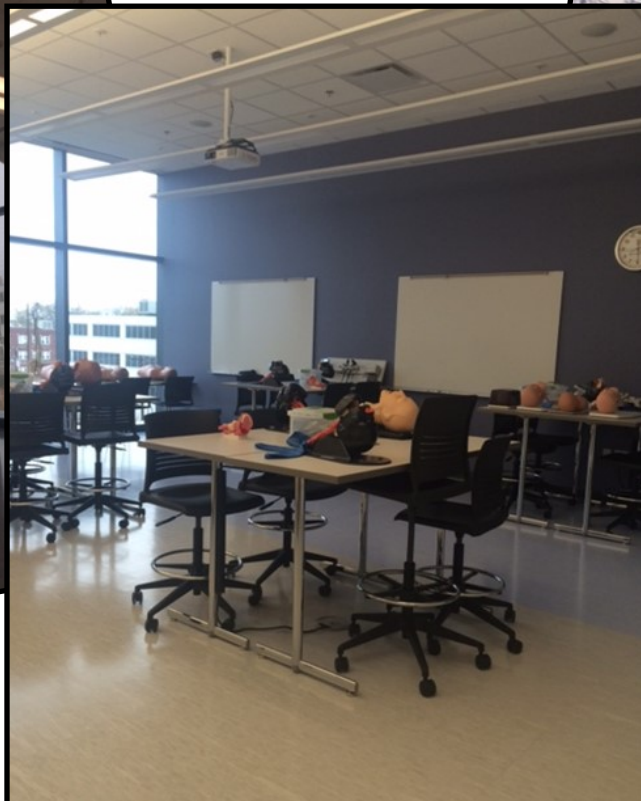
What an adventure! We moved and we are almost settled in!!

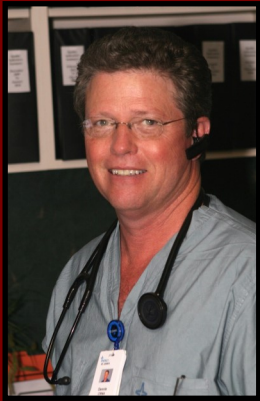

Senior Desiree Mauppins attends Annual Congress

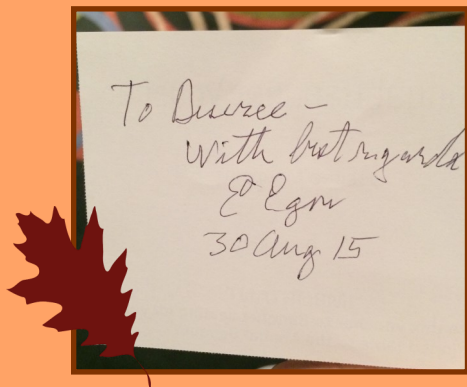
The American Association of Nurse Anesthetists (AANA) Annual Congress was held in Salt Lake City, Utah, on Friday, August 29-September 1, 2015. Desiree Mauppins, a senior at Missouri State University School of Anesthesia, attended the Congress as a representative for the School as well as for the AANA Foundation Student Advocate Program.

Each day the Congress was packed with a variety of educational sessions pertaining to topics such as pain management, advanced airway management, ultrasound, OB and anesthesia, career planning, perioperative management of pacemakers, AICDs, stents, anesthesia for patients with valvular heart disease, pharmacology, malpractice, journal writing, billing and coding for anesthesia, newest technology in anesthesia, and many more. The AANA 2015 mobile application is available for download to view all the sessions that were presented.

The Congress provided an opportunity to network amongst CRNAs and SRNAs across the United States. Mauppins had the honor of meeting with two very well-known legends in anesthesia: Dr. John Naglehout and Dr. Edmond Eger. Dr. Naglehout has written several anesthesia textbooks, but he also teaches pharmacology courses at MSU for the School of Anesthesia. Dr. Edmond Eger, also known as “The Gas Man,” developed the concepts (MAC) minimum alveolar concentration and inhaled anesthetic uptake and distribution. “This was one of the most inspirational moments for me,” Mauppins said.

Other activities at the annual congress included visiting the Exhibit hall with approximately 130 vendors with the latest products and services in anesthesia; over 30 students presented the newest research in anesthesia through poster and verbal presentations. The AANA Foundation CRNAs who attended the Annual Congress were approved for 26 AANA continuing education credits.

In the evenings, attendants at the Congress toured the city, ate, and danced at two of the AANA Foundation fundraisers—“One Night-Twice the Fun” and “Shake it for a Cause Dance Party.” The AANA Foundation raised money that will go towards student scholarships for advancing the science of anesthesia through education and research.

SPOTLIGHT

ALUMNI

Marv Colyer began his anesthesia training at Southwest School of Anesthesia for Nurse Anesthetists at St. John's Hospital in Springfield, Missouri, on September 1, 1962. He graduated August 31, 1964.

After returning from serving in the US Army in April 1969, Colyer attended his second MOANA fall meeting in Kansas City and was immediately "hooked" on the statewide/national organization dealing with all the challenges involving the organization. He volunteered for the by-laws committee for the 1972-76 term, ran for the Director of Region III for the 1976-80 term and Vice President for the term from 1980-82. He attended all state meetings throughout that time plus Spring Assembly in Chicago each year before it became Mid-year Assembly in Washington DC. Fall assembly's floated from location to location during that time as much as it does now.

Colyer and his wife started what turned out to be several businesses over the years in addition to continuing to do anesthesia full-time. In the fall of 1981, Colyer's dad passed and the first business was struggling. Colyer said, "Something had to give." So, he and his wife discontinued their first business and the extra work on the MOANA board until things turned around in 1985. At that time, Colyer was back on the MOANA board as Director Region III, then Vice President, running for President elect for 1988 and President Elect in 1989. He became President from 1990-91 and Past President from 1992-93. "During the 1989-91 years we attempted to get prescriptive authority for MOANA. It was a tough, mean battle, 'not gonna happen.' Thank you MSA," Colyer said.

Colyer was awarded as Federal Director of the Year by the AANA in 2011.

Colyer had never had any medical problems and was running at least 15-20 miles a week. However, in the Spring of 1993 he had to stop on the road driving home from Illinois where he and his wife had been visiting family. He called it an "incident," refusing to call it what it was. He was sweaty and tachy and had to stop the car to lay down. His wife drove the rest of the way home. Two days later he had a four vessel CABG. He was back to work a month later.

In 1995, Colyer became the Federal Political Director culminating in 2012. He was awarded the Political Director of the year by AANA in 2011. "What a ride," he said. "The world of Nurse Anesthesia has been a real blessing in our lives. It has given us the ability to work, travel, have several small businesses, and put our two children through two private schools. One of our children is a chiropractor and a professional musician; the other is a Nurse Practitioner in Women's Health and married to a CRNA. Both of them are at Missouri Baptist in Saint Louis. We also have two wonderful grandchildren," Colyer said.

The most memorable event of Colyer's career was six months after he had the CABG. There was a 3 o'clock a.m. stat c-section on a very large lady with ARDS. Colyer had never seen a case of ARDS. He had gone to a lecture on OB anesthesia one year before at an AANA meeting in Nashville. The doctor doing the lecture was explaining what to do if one ever encountered this scene. He said, "One: avoid it, two: pray and three: get ready for public relations because you will have to try to 'spin' through PR in the best way you know how." Colyer said the case was over in 35 minutes, but it felt like 30 hours. Both mother and baby made it and the mother came back a month later to tell him how grateful she was. Colyer was supposed to have a follow-up stress test the next day as a follow-up to the CABG, but he cancelled it as he had just had one of the greatest stress tests of his entire career.

Colyer stated one of the most important advances in the world of nurse anesthesia is the use of EKG and pulse oximetry. These did not come into play until the early 1990s. "These have to be the biggest anesthesia life extender's of all time along with the excellent inhalation agents that have been invented," he said. Colyer has had the opportunity to do over 60,000 cases with approximately one-half of those being done before the pulse oximetry was introduced. "I have not known many guys or gals that have been in 'foxholes' or anesthetist that were atheist," he said.
