

SILVA SCHOLARSHIP

Taylor Frymire, junior student, received the 2019 Silva Scholarship. As a recipient of this award, a student must be a second year student and show exemplary clinical skills. This fund was established in 2019 by John Silva, an MSU School of Anesthesia alumnus. This annual \$1,000 scholarship is presented to one MSU School of Anesthesia student.

John Silva graduated from Southwest Missouri School of Nurse Anesthesia at St. John's Hospital in Springfield, Missouri, in 1972. He spent 20 outstanding and successful years completing over 20 thousand cases in anesthesia. Silva has retired as a CRNA. The School of Anesthesia Clinical Scholarship is awarded to junior students who have been nominated by their clinical sites, performing as excellent clinical anesthesia students. Globally Minded CRNAs

Eric Kramer, CRNA, FNP, is currently in the process of completing his DNAP with MSU School of Anesthesia.

On January 9-10, 2019, Kramer found himself in a class at Samaritan's Purse Headquarters for training on the protocols for treating and managing Ebola. On January 23, he got the call and a few days later flew to Entebbe, Uganda, where he would be treating and managing Ebola patients. The Ebola treatment center Kramer went to in Entebbe, Uganda, had just been built, from the ground up by a Disaster Assistance Response Team (DART) sent by Samaritan's Purse and was just beginning to receive patients.

"As I heard stories from doctors and nurses who had volunteered, I realized Ebola was something different than anything I'd ever experienced," Kramer said. "I go, because I'm a Christian, and Jesus tells us to put it on the line for others."

Samaritan's Purse is a Christian nonprofit with many different outreaches. One of them is a disaster response team called DART. When there is a disaster or humanitarian crisis somewhere in the world, an Incident Management Team is formed to evaluate whether to activate and deploy a DART.

Jeremy Olson has been participating in annual mission trips to Uganda for the past five years. He graduated from MSU School of Anesthesia in 2009.

I graduated from the program at the end of 2009 and I am so thankful for the training and the people I got to learn from at Missouri State. I've been fortunate to be able to go and work in Cambodia, Dominican Republic, Philippines, Romania, and Uganda through two organizations: World Outreach Foundation and Medical Missions Foundation.

The picture shown at left is from Uganda where I have been going annually for the last five years. The city we go to is called Gulu and is about 50 miles from South Sudan. The surgical mission is composed of 4-5 surgical teams and we perform 150-200 cases in a weeks time. I provide anesthesia for pediatric burn patients where we focus on skin grafts and contracture releases. The other surgical teams include general, ENT, and urology.

However, this year will be a little different as I will be going to Kalongo, Uganda, on an exploratory mission composed of a five person team. We will provide surgical treatments to this new area and assess whether it will be a good situation for a large surgical mission for the future.


I am so thankful that I went to Missouri State and received the training to learn anesthesia as a CRNA. Eighty percent of the worlds population live in poverty and don't have access to health care. Working in these missions have been such a reward in growing as a CRNA and as a person. It's been a wonderful experience and career.

"I have good memories from school and I was fortunate to have good preceptors. I was taught and challenged daily and when I encounter situations or prepare for a case I frequently hear their voices telling me how to proceed," Kuhns said.

This year, Kuhns wanted to begin giving a scholarship award to an MSU School of Anesthesia student, and he did it!

"My desire is to help someone struggling to meet the demands of returning to college later in life because I understand these situations. I was fortunate to have help during times when things were not looking good. One positive intervention changed the circumstances for me and I am grateful for that. I am now in a position to help someone. I want to help someone achieve the goal that I had because becoming a CRNA is a life changing achievement," said Kuhns.

Life in Full Color Opens Up New World for School of Anesthesia Student


"SO MANY THINGS HAVE COLOR THAT I HAD NO IDEA HAD COLOR."


In first grade, Justin Layton remembers seeing the circle-dot color test for the first time. He failed that test and was told that he was color blind. As a child, he remembers getting angry at kids that would rip off the paper of the crayons so that he wouldn't be able tell what color the crayons were.

LIVING IN A WORLD WITH NO COLOR

Layton has learned to adjust over the years, knowing that at times he needs to ask questions regarding colors. On one occasion, he wandered through an empty building where his class was located to find a stranger that could decipher what color he was assigned in a group project. Life without color was "normal" for Layton and he didn't feel it had effected his life too much.

He went on to graduate with his nursing degree from Grand Canyon





Layton's mom was a huge source of inspiration for him. She went back to school at the age of 50 to get her bachelor's degree in Nursing. She was the one who told Layton about Certified Registered Nurse Anesthetists. Before then, he had never heard of CRNAs.



Layton's wife, Laura, has encouraged him along the way and has been supportive of his every decision. This past fall, she surprised him with Enchroma glasses which amplify color and are designed specifically for color blind people. She took him to Nathaniel Greene Park where the fall color was especially notable.

"I had no clue trees came in those colors: Hot pink? Neon fire orange? Fire engine Red? Purple? I always thought those descriptor words for colors were stupid, until now! I am overwhelmed at this new world: seeing my kid's eyes for the first time, seeing my wife's eyes for the first time, the vibrant colors of street signs and advertisement billboards, and the bright red on the American flag," Layton said. He urges, "Enjoy the color around you. Don't take it for granted!"

Layton continues to pursue his dream as a Nurse Anesthetist in a more colorful world. "The job of a Nurse Anesthetist is pretty awesome: putting people to sleep, waking them back up, keeping people pain free, and helping the laboring mother, how incredible is that?"
