






FIRST-TIME NEW IN COLLEGE UNDERGRADUATE BEARS TEST SCORES

Fall 2022

In 2021, 22 out of 50 states reported at least 50% of students taking the ACT. Of those 22 states, 5 had average ACT scores that exceeded the national average of 20.3. Missouri was one of those states, recording an average ACT score of 20.6 in 2021.*

While ACT and SAT scores are not currently required for admission, **most (80.2%)** first-time undergraduate Bears submitted ACT scores.







More than 3,000 students live in university housing.

Other campus units not included above are the Fruit Experiment Station at Mountain Grove, MO, the Department of Defense and Strategic Studies located in Fairfax, VA, the West Plains campus, and a site in Dalian, China.

Physical changes continue on the Springfield campus:

- The John Goodman Amphitheatre project provided Tent Theatre with an approximate 6,400 square foot, open air theatre with a permanent stage and fixed tiers for 331 removable seats. The structure is fitted with electrical and audio/video infrastructure to support equipment as needed for performances. The project includes an arts park, a place for students to gather and study, and a pavilion that can be used all year, not only for Tent Theatre productions, but for other university events and as outdoor classroom space. There were approximately 25,000 square feet of site improvements surrounding the amphitheatre including new storm water management, hardscapes, landscaping and lighting serving the new art park.
- Completion of the renovation of the Ann
 Kampeter Health Sciences Hall, home of the
 McQueary College of Health and Human
 Services, modernized the building to better
 serve students. Features in the newly renovated
 spaces of Kampeter Hall include dedicated
 student study spaces, a centralized MCHHS
 Student Success and Advisement Center, two
 upgraded classrooms, newly renovated
 bathrooms on all floors, upgrades to all common
 spaces, upgraded office space, and significant
 upgrades to the heating and cooling systems in
 the building.
- Construction of a new pre-engineered metal building that is approximately 10,000 square feet at the Roy Blunt Jordan Valley Innovation
 Center (JVIC) will include a conference room, offices, teaching lab, composite site, mezzanine

- for mechanical/electrical and storage and support spaces. The commercial-scale braider facility at JVIC will serve the dual purpose of housing the braider system and creating an Advanced Composite Materials (ACMs) learning lab and classroom to meet workforce training needs in ACMs. Construction is scheduled to be complete in summer 2023.
- A welcoming, accessible entrance connecting MSU's property south of Grand Street to the rest of campus while providing ADA parking within those lots was created with the improvements to the **Pedestrian Underpass.** The project provided an ADA accessible ramp from parking lot 22 down to the existing tunnel under Grand Street. A new elevator was added to the north end of the tunnel in front of the Art Annex.
