







FIRST-TIME NEW IN COLLEGE UNDERGRADUATE BEARS TEST SCORES

Fall 2025

In 2024, 50 out of 50 states reports at least 36% of students taking the ACT. Of those 50 states, 32 had average ACT scores that exceeded the national average of 19.4. Missouri was one of those states, recording an average ACT score of 19.8 in 2024.*

While ACT and SAT scores are not currently required for admission, most (66.2%) first-time undergraduate Bears submitted ACT scores.



Our average ACT scores were **higher than** the state and national averages.









Knowledge Rate is the percent of graduates for which the institution has reasonable and verifiable first-destination information. The 2023-2024 knowledge rate for Missouri State University is 75.0%. The 2017-2019 knowledge rate averaged 91%, and after sinking to 63% in 2020-2022, it is on the rise again.

More than 4,000 students live in university housing.

Other campus units not included above are the Fruit Experiment Station at Mountain Grove, Missouri, the Department of Defense and Strategic Studies located in Fairfax, Virginia, the West Plains campus and a site in Dalian, China.

Physical changes continue on the Springfield campus:

- Blunt Hall Phase I and II are comprised of an addition to the building and renovation to the existing space for College of Natural and Applied Sciences. The 77,000-square-foot addition, completed in summer 2025, features modern, well-equipped labs, updated lecture halls and outdoor learning spaces. The project strengthens university support for students in the sciences and support of faculty research. The renovation of the existing 126,000 square feet includes window, door and roof replacements, new LED lighting, lab renovations and restroom upgrades. Phase II to be complete in fall 2026.
- A 10,000-square-foot addition and renovation to the northwest corner of Kemper Hall was completed for the School of Construction, Design and Project Management. This addition provided space for more hands-on learning with large equipment for construction management students. The renovation also created open computer and surveying technology labs, rooftop terrace, new restrooms, storage sites and a student study lounge.



BEARWEAR FRIDAYS

On BearWear Fridays, we wear maroon and white! And on many other days, of course. The Office of Institutional Research (OIR) serves as a centralized resource to campus decision-makers and planners by providing an objective standard for determining the extent to which MSU achieves its core mission of educated persons, as well as determining the extent to which MSU achieves its stated goals.

The Bear Stats, prepared by OIR, provides data supplied annually for the purpose of state and federal compliance. These data are routinely produced by OIR and used to fulfill Missouri State University's obligations to a variety of external agencies, including the National Center for Education Statistics (NCES), the Board of Governors, a variety of federal and state governmental units, and rating/ranking publications.
