





# FIRST-TIME NEW IN COLLEGE UNDERGRADUATE BEARS TEST SCORES

Fall 2023

In 2023, 50 out of 50 states reported at least 37% of students taking the ACT. Of those 50 states, 31 had average ACT scores that exceeded the national average of 19.5. Missouri was one of those states, recording an average ACT score of 19.8 in 2023.\*

While ACT and SAT scores are not currently required for admission, **most (76.5%)** first-time undergraduate Bears in fall 2023 submitted ACT scores.



Our average ACT scores were **higher than** the state and national averages.







The 2017-2019 knowledge rate averaged 91%, and after sinking to 63% in 2020-2022, it is on the rise again.

Other campus units not included above are the Fruit Experiment Station at Mountain Grove, MO, the Department of Defense and Strategic Studies located in Fairfax, VA, the West Plains campus, and a site in Dalian, China.

Physical changes continue on the Springfield campus:

■ Construction of a new pre-engineered metal building that is approximately 10,300 square feet at the Darr Agricultural Center provided the college with space for the Animal Science and Companion Animal programs. The **Small Animal Education Center** includes a lobby, restrooms, offices, treatment room, animal bathing, food storage and laundry, group activity and training lab, teaching laboratory, six indoor and outdoor runs, an outdoor play area, mechanical/electrical, and support spaces.




■ The Jordan Valley Innovation Center, Building 4 project provided finished space for the Missouri Cybersecurity Center of Excellence (MCCOE) and for Brewer Science. The first floor space for MCCOE included approximately 2.500 square feet with the potential for expansion to 3,200 square feet. The new space includes a breakout area, office, control platform. operations floor, and support spaces. The second floor space is for Brewer Science. The new area is approximately 10.400 square feet with an additional area of 3,200 square feet of existing space in Building 3 being reconfigured. The work included a conference room, offices. flex offices, personal health room, open office workstations, break area, lab, clean room, and support spaces.






