



MSU's FY2025 Operating Budget




MSU's Operating Appropriations







A one percent increase from fall one to fall two would lead, on average of the past five years, to an additional 22 to 28 students annually for the FTNIC cohort and 13 to 15 students for fall first-time transfer students.



Projection models from enrollment management

- This model is used for calculating the number of undergraduate degree seeking students moving through the pipeline.
- We use the previous fall's (2024) census enrollment of UG DS students.
- So this model assumes that new student enrollment will be the same as last year.
- We used the previous fall to fall return rates and calculate the number of students who would return from fall 2024 to fall 2025. So this model assume all retention rates, even broken down by class and type, will be the same as the previous year.
- We also consider in the model the enrollment of new and readmit students that start in the spring and summer, and return to the fall. So this model assumes new students who start in the spring or summer and return to the fall will be the same as the previous year.
- The model then calculates all of those totals and determines a "projected" fall 2025 UG DS enrollment.
- Then the model finds the difference between actual fall 2024 and the fall 2025 projection. That number shows our projected increase or decrease in UG DS students.
- In this year's model, the projected UG DS enrollment is 14,166. Last year's actual UG DS enrollment was 14,087. Thus, the model predicts an increase of 79 (0.6%) students.





In 1950, Walls was the first Black student to apply to Missouri State. Though she was qualified – she was salutatorian of her class – she was denied admission.

Faurot Hall is the first administration building on the Fruit Experiment Station at Mountain Grove. Completed in 1901, it is among the original buildings of the Missouri State Fruit Experiment Station.

Faurot Hall was designed by Henry H. Hohenschild, state architect, in the Tudor Revival style popular at the turn of the century. It was constructed of brick fired from clay dug on the station grounds. The building honors Frederick Faurot, a prominent horticulturist and director of the Station from 1918 to 1933. Faurot Hall was placed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1979.

Renovated in 1998, Faurot Hall now houses offices, a large lecture hall, a student laboratory, and a distance learning classroom in the Mary Lou Sallee Conference Room.
