

Life Care Plan



A Plan in the Making

Many families whose lives are impacted by disability worry about the future. Have you ever found yourself asking:

- Who will care for my loved one when I am gone?
- Will he have the resources and services he needs?
- Who will look out for her well-being?
- Who will make important medical, treatment and life decisions?

If so, the Life Care Plan may be just what you need to achieve peace of mind regarding the future of your loved one with a disability.

The Life Care Plan provides individualized planning services for families whose lives are affected by disability. Through the development of a personalized Life Care Plan, our trained professionals help families ask and answer difficult questions about the future. The process allows you to consider the financial, legal and social resources your loved one may need now and in the years to come while detailing an accurate picture of his or her wants, needs, and preferences. Additionally, it helps identify caregivers (including individuals, groups, associations, facilities and/ or institutions) early on who are available to provide continued support as your loved one ages, serving as a stable presence and circle of support.

The Life Care Plan is a living document that should be updated annually or as circumstances change for you or your loved one. By providing direct services and support to its clients when family members cannot manage alone or are unavailable, the Life Care Plan fills a critical void for families planning for loved ones with a disability. It can also relieve family members and close friends of overwhelming responsibilities and help keep difficult situations from arising.

Key Life Care Plan Components

- **Monitoring:** We will be there when the family can no longer maintain oversight of the living, learning, working and healthcare environments.
- Advocacy: We ensure that the system is fully meeting the needs of the client, and the client is receiving the benefits to which he or she is entitled.
- **Guardianship**: We can assume responsibility for surrogate decision-making for clients who have been deemed in need of a guardian.
- **Payee Representation:** We will manage public benefits monies, including those from the Social Security Administration, to pay the client's bills and issue spending money.
- **Conservatorship:** We can manage the client's financial resources when the court has deemed it to be necessary.
- **Coaching:** With proper support and guidance, we can help the client cope with life's demands and responsibilities, including money management.
- **Recordkeeping:** We record and provide a permanent repository of medical information, family and individual data, and plan desires.
- **Trusteeship:** We provide trusteeship within our pooled trust program and for stand-alone trusts.

SERVICES PROVIDED

Home Based Services

Our home-based services are designed to help your child in an environment where they are comfortable and feel secure. During our first meeting with parents, we encourage them to identify the fears and hopes they have for their child. This helps us to begin to understand your current priorities as a family for your child.

We will also work with the entire family to identify goals that are relevant to day to day life – such as communicating, sleeping, eating, playing and community-based goals. We will cover what your child is able to do and is not yet demonstrating through an assessment and begin to develop a customized plan that highlights your child's strengths and needs.

Each program developed is focused on the individual and specific needs of the family and child. With our plan in place, we will work to close the gap between their existing skills, including their behavior, compared to that of their typically developing peers. We will work with you to find therapists that are right for your home based program. We will also continually monitor the progress your child makes.

Parent Training Services

Caring for a child with autism can be challenging. Our parent training services are customized and based on parent priorities to treat socially significant behaviors such as aggression, self-injury, communication, and adaptive skills that enhance the lives of the individuals, such as dressing and toileting. We offer parent training inclusive of home-based services; however, it is also provided alone in situations where needed.

School Consultation

At Autism Services of Kansas, we also offer school consultations. We encourage collaboration and coordination with other professionals that may be working with your child. We believe that consistency across all team members will increase your child's success.



Transition Program

KANSAS CITY

Health care transition, or HCT, is the process of getting your child ready for health care as an adult.

During childhood, you usually help with health and health care needs calling to set up appointments, filling out forms, and keeping track of medications. As your youth gets older, managing those needs becomes their own responsibility. Achieving this independence requires an organized transition process for them to gain independent health care skills, prepare for an adult model of care, and transfer to new clinicians.

It also means planning for young adults who will continue to be dependent upon others.





Day Services

Day Services are adult programs and activities that provide meaningful engagement designed to enrich their lives.

Individuals enrolled in Day Services participate in a variety of activities at our centers and in the community and they enjoy learning opportunities such as daily-living skills, health and recreation programs, and volunteering opportunities.

We offer Day Services across our sites and centers.

Service Coordination and Targeted Case Management

Targeted Case Managers (TCM) provide leadership, advocacy, and expertise to ensure individuals connect with and benefit from needed services and supports. Case managers and Service Coordinators provide quality assurance oversight and help individuals and their families or guardians obtain funding, medical, health, psychiatric and community services, and resources that enhance their preferred lifestyle.

For those who dual-elect GoodLife Residential and targeted case management services, representative payee services are available at no fee.

Behavioral Support Services

Our goal with our behavioral support services is to reduce barriers to independence for adults with I/DD posed by problem behaviors and skill deficits.

Through our Quality Behavioral Support Services Clinic, our team of doctoral students supervised by a doctoral-level board certified behavior analyst (BCBA-D), consult with targeted case managers and other behavior analysts about severe problem behaviors and complex cases, make sure staff is following behavior support plans, and help to develop programs that assist in meaningful skill building.

Children's Services

Children's Services include North Star Academy and the Johnson County Montessori School and both programs reside on a shared campus.

North Star Academy provides Early Intensive Behavioral Intervention (EIBI) through Applied Behavior Analysis (ABA) therapy for children ages 2.5 to 12 years with Autism Spectrum Disorder and other intellectual or developmental disabilities.

At North Star Academy, our goal is for children to acquire the skills necessary for inclusion in public schools, and meaningful social relationships. Children (and their families) have access to on-site behavioral training, on-site speech-language therapy, and occupational therapy with highly credentialed clinicians.

The shared campus with Johnson County Montessori School provides opportunities to interact with typically developing peers in a supportive and inclusive setting.

Midnight Farm

Midnight Farm allows individuals with disabilities to work, learn, and grow in the natural beauty of a rural, 40-acre farm setting in Douglas County, KS.

Programs at Midnight Farm teach life, social, and job skills through hands-on activities like animal care, gardening, pottery, printmaking, cooking, musical theater, exercise classes, and more.

The programs and services at Midnight Farm are widely accessible to those interested in participating in Day Services programming or special Midnight Farm activities.

Residential Services

GoodLife's residential programs offer a variety of living arrangements developed around the level of need of the individual. Our residential models include our award-winning Neighborhood Network model, our Family Teaching model, our Intensive Support Homes, and our Professional Family Teaching model.

Each person served benefits from a Quality of Life Plan and an individualized schedule of preferred daily activities. GoodLife specialists, including nurses, behavioral analysts, therapists, and other clinicians provide additional support when needed.

iLink Technologies


iLink Technologies is GoodLife's innovative in-home technology system that maximizes an individual's privacy and self-direction capabilities to enable greater independence.

iLink is an extension of the GoodLife caregiver team, operated by staff who know each individual personally and who provide a virtual presence in each home. Using iLink, staff can remotely monitor and support health, behavioral, and safety needs, control home automations, and can deploy and supervise in-home help. iLink Technologies allows us to reduce unnecessary intrusions and offer more opportunities for independence and privacy.

"The beauty and magic of the partnership between a horse and its rider has long been celebrated as a symbol of dynamic unity; an emotional connection that helps heal and energize."





The **Take Me Home** program is a database maintained by the Johnson County (Kansas) Sheriff's Office and is only accessible to law enforcement personnel. The system includes a picture, disability, physical description, emergency contact information, and map of all registered individuals. If a person in the **Take Me Home** program is encountered alone by a police officer, or is reported missing, the officer can access the database by the person's name or description to locate their enrollment record. With this information at hand, the officer can appropriately assist your loved one.

Who can enroll ?

• Any child OR adult who may have difficulty communicating due to a developmental or cognitive disability.

• These individuals tend to be at risk for wandering and may include people with disabilities such as Alzheimer's, Autism, Dementia, Down syndrome, Traumatic Brain Injury (TBI), etc.

• As of the end of April 2021, there were approximately 726 people enrolled in the Johnson County Take Me Home Program.

• Johnson County Sheriff's Department started our program in 2011. It is free to citizens and voluntary to enroll.







BRIEF HISTORY

- In 2018, the staff and Directors of Hope Ranch Therapeutic Riding Center, a riding center that specializes in horseback riding for individuals with
 various disabilities, visited the camp and took a tour as the camp was presented as a sale property.
- · After careful consideration the decision was made to procure the property and start a camp for individuals with disabilities.
- Our first camp was held in the summer of 2019 and was a true example of watching campers with special needs develop relationships and gain selfconfidence.
- Summer of 2020 COVID 19 was in full-swing and camp had to be cancelled due to COVID 19.
- Summer Camp 2021 saw a huge increase in campers as well as many firsts for the camp. We had for the first-time campers that stayed over the
 weekends to continue their camp experience. We will retool to provide this in the future summers. We also had to close registration on a couple of
 weeks due to the ratio of campers to staff members. This will be worked through when we start hiring for Summer 2022.









GOALS

- Mission Creek Camp & Retreat Center is raising the bar for camps for individuals with special needs with the idea of working through each person's
 individuality and achievement activities. Therefore, our motto is, "Inspire the Possible."
- · Providing an atmosphere where a camper's disability is perceived as normal, and achievement is possible
- Our short-term goal for 2022 Camp Season is to have 35 to 50 campers per week of camp in the summer. This would increase the camper numbers by over 100% for the summer camp session.
- Our long-term goal is to have 1250 campers throughout the summer months, averaging 120 130 campers per week during the summer camping season. There also should be an additional 650 individuals participating in retreats and conferences during the rest of the year.
- Develop plan to renovate the camp to be accessible to individuals who are in wheelchairs or use walkers

Mission Creek Camp & Retreat Center was started to give the camp experience to individuals with disabilities through an innovative camp program that incorporates the freedom to try activities they normally are not able to do, specifically in the areas of horseback riding, fishing, boating, camp sports, art and music. Bear POWER (Promoting Opportunities for Work, Education and Resilience) is a two and a half year (five semester) inclusive college program for students with intellectual and developmental disabilities at Missouri State University. The program was created to offer a post-secondary education opportunity for students transitioning out of high school. Bear POWER is an approved Comprehensive Transition Program (CTP) by the United States Department of Education and is listed on thinkcollege.net.

Four Pillars of Bear POWER

Academic

Students engage in the equivalent of 12 credits per semester through the combination of audited courses, support sessions and internships. They choose an "area of concentration" using person centered planning methods. After completion of five semesters in the program, students will get a Bear POWER certificate and walk in the graduation ceremony with their peers.

Social

Ambassadors are Missouri State student volunteers who provide a "circle of support" and integration within academic and social settings for each Bear POWER student. Mentors provide support in the areas of academic, social, health and wellness.

Independent Living

It is a requirement for students to live on campus during their enrollment in the program. This provides them with countless opportunities to learn independent living skills. Through hands on experiences, they will learn time management, basic cooking, cleaning and chores while living in a shared space.

Job Readiness

Career guidance and support is a critical part of the Bear POWER curriculum. Students will create a Person-Centered Plan and identify their interests in employment areas upon graduation. Support sessions will assist students in developing a resume and practicing interview skills. Students will also be required to participate in internship experiences, both on campus and within the community.



Special Needs With Address Notification

The S.W.A.N. program allows families to voluntarily submit information about any individual in their household with special needs to Emergency Services (Fire, Police, Medical), in the event that they need to respond to your home during an emergency. This information would be attached to the family's address on the Computer Assisted Dispatch system and visible only to the Emergency Responders that are en route to the call. For example: 123 ABC Street – "17 year old teen diagnosed with Autism, non-verbal. Uses a Talk Tablet. Loves the police but will be slow to communicate. Please, no lights/sirens."

Pre-Employment Transition Services

Empowering youth with disabilities to achieve their highest employment potential is one of the major goals of Rehabilitation Services (RS). To help achieve this goal, RS is providing Pre-Employment Transition Services (Pre-ETS), which were authorized by the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act. Pre-ETS are designed to provide job exploration, counseling and other services to help young people prepare for employment and self-reliance, rather than dependency on public benefits.

Coordination/collaboration between VR and Special Education is essential to assure that students with disabilities have access to the continuum of services they need to become employed and self-reliant. Students with disabilities are defined as individuals who are not younger than age 14 (the earliest age for the provision of transition services under IDEA) and not older than age 21.

- In addition, the student must be participating in a secondary, post-secondary or other recognized education program. Educational programs include: secondary education programs; non-traditional or alternative secondary education programs including home schooling; post-secondary education programs; and other recognized educational programs, such as those offered through the juvenile justice system.
- The student meets one of the following criteria to verify disability: The student is eligible for and
 receiving services under an Individual Education Plan (special education) OR the student is an
 individual with a disability as defined under Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act.
 - o An individual with a disability as defined in Section 504 means: any person who:
 - Has a physical or mental impairment that substantially limits one or more major life activities;
 - (2) Has a record of such an impairment; or
 - (3) Is regarded as having such an impairment.

Major life activities include walking, seeing, hearing, speaking, breathing, learning, working, caring for oneself, and performing manual tasks.

Students with disabilities may request Pre-ETS services directly or be referred by the Local Education Agency (LEA). RS will not implement any arbitrary age or time frame limit on when a student with a disability (as defined above) can submit request for Pre-ETS services. RS will coordinate with the individual, the LEAs and the individual's IEP regarding initiation of and provision of services.

Services are designed to be an early start at job exploration and to assist students with disabilities in making the transition from secondary to post-secondary education/training and competitive integrated employment.

The Whole Person's Youth Services provide services that meet the transitional, educational, and social needs of youth with disabilities. Their goal and ours is to help youth with disabilities learn the independent living skills needed to make a successful transition into adulthood.

Our current program features the following:

DIY Life Skills Class

An 8-week course for youth 18-24 years old, offered four times per year. Youth will learn to advocate for themselves, how to budget, how to cook, how to do laundry and self care.

- High School Youth Transition to Independence Program
 An 8-12 week high school course that provides students with skills and resources necessary to have for transitioning from high school into adulthood.

Individualized instruction in sign language for infants and children up to 12 years. The Whole Family Program seeks to increase the ability of families to communicate with their children who are deaf or nonverbal while increasing their knowledge and understanding of deafness, the deaf community and other available options for their children.
