

Overview

The Office of Student Conduct exists to serve the students of the Missouri State University community. The office is responsible for the implementation of the Code of Student Rights and Responsibilities, adjudicating alleged violations of the Code, safeguarding student rights, and dealing with emergency situations which involve students.

All Missouri State University students possess certain rights and privileges. Each student is due respect of their personal dignity and property, and in turn is responsible for maintaining standards of personal behavior which do not interfere with the rights of others or with the functioning of the University.

The Office of Student Conduct recognizes that every facet of student life is an opportunity for learning and inquiry. The Code of Student Rights and Responsibilities should be viewed as an educational tool designed to assist students in their endeavors to educate themselves and become active, involved, and responsible citizens.

Mission

The mission of the Office of Student Conduct is to educate and empower students concerning their rights, privileges, and responsibilities. Our approach utilizes [The Code of Student Rights and Responsibilities](#), and University policies as educational tools designed to promote inquiry, engagement, and personal development. We are committed to repairing harm, facilitating constructive dialogue, and promoting accountability and personal growth. We strive to uphold the values of fairness, inclusivity, and educational development. This is achieved through an equitable and participatory process where enforcing University policies, mediation, and conflict resolution promotes community engagement, and reflective learning.

Learning Outcomes

- Students who have engaged in the conduct process will understand, the behavioral standards of Missouri State University, and explain the value of the conduct process for themselves and the university community.
- Students who have engaged in the conduct process will be able to evaluate how their behavior has impacted their educational experience and well-being.
- Students who have engaged in the conduct process will reflect on how their behavior impacts their relationships with others, as well as the campus community.
- Students who have engaged in the conduct process will identify campus and community resources that support personal and professional development.
- Students who have engaged in the conduct process will be able to outline their personal goals, and values, and assess how/if their behavior does/does not align with their values and goals.

Scope

The Office of Student Conduct works with Residence Life, Housing, and Dining Services, University Safety, and the Springfield Police Substation to uphold the Code of Student Rights and Responsibilities. Hall Directors (8), and Assistant Hall Directors (4) work collaboratively with the Office of Student Conduct to adjudicate all Code violations. The Office of Student Conduct adjudicates cases of discrimination and discriminatory harassment (4.3) after receiving investigative reports from Office of Institutional Equity and Compliance/Title IX staff and in accordance with policy Op.1.02-2 Discrimination Complaint and Investigation Procedures.

The Office of Student Conduct is responsible for maintaining all Student Conduct records for individual students and student organizations. The Office of Student Conduct utilizes Maxient as a record keeping database.

Trainings

Residence Life, Housing, and Dining Services staff, specifically Hall Directors and Assistant Hall Directors, are trained semesterly through the Office of Student Conduct, during summer and winter trainings, and special topic trainings throughout the academic year. Trainings include: the history and philosophy of student conduct, how to hold a conduct meeting, how to navigate and utilize Maxient, and scenario work.

The Office of Student Conduct provided training to the Missouri State University West Plains student conduct staff about Maxient, the conduct process, and procedural due process.

The Office of Student Conduct provided trainings and presentations to Fraternity and Sorority Life leaders including chapter presidents, and governing council leadership teams. Additionally, the Office of Student Conduct provided presentations to registered student organization leadership.

The Office of Student Conduct provided training to the Student Government Association Judicial Board and served as the advisor to this board.

The Office of Student Conduct provided training to Bear POWER staff members about utilizing Maxient as a note and database system for their students.

The Office of Student Conduct provided training and guidance on Maxient to staff members in the Registrars Office about utilization of the database to update forms, letters, cases, and reporting forms for various processes run through the office and recorded in the system.

Educational & Outreach Programs

The Office of Student Conduct staff enjoy providing educational programs, presentations, and outreach to students, student organizations, faculty and staff.

In the 2025 – 2026 academic year, the Office of Student Conduct staff facilitated multiple educational and outreach programs, presentations, and social media campaigns.

Here is a sample of the programs provided:

- What Would Boomer Do Wednesdays Weekly Social Media Campaign

- Multiple Alcohol Awareness Presentations for fraternities
- National Hazing Awareness Week Social Media Campaign
- Multiple hazing prevention 101 presentations to faculty, staff, and students
- Tabling at various campus events including Transfer Orientation Expo, Resident Assistant resource fair, and campus visit days

Some cases require investigations prior to adjudication to gather information and determine if there is enough evidence to move forward to a conduct case. Investigation meetings only began being tracked in Spring 2025, which is why data from this year is the only information listed.

Case Type (Adjudicated)

All students who have potentially violated a policy will participate in a conduct meeting. Students have the opportunity to present information about their responsibility for the alleged policy violations. The Conduct Officer then determines responsibility based on the evidence and using the preponderance of evidence standard.

If a student disagrees with the finding of responsibility and/or the consequences assigned, they maintain their right to appeal the decision. If the consequence proposed is separation from the university in some capacity (Housing Suspension or Dismissal, University Suspension, Dismissal, or Denial of Privilege to Re-Enroll), the student may request a hearing.

** Due to the 2020 Title IX Regulations, at the time of this report, the Office of Student Conduct does not investigate or adjudicate cases of sexual harassment or other forms of sexual misconduct (4.20).

*** These policy violations are considered low-level policy violations. For a first-time violation of these policies, students receive an informal warning letter, but the case does not get adjudicated. Thus, there is a large number of “No Finding” results for these cases as there is no official finding of responsibility or not. The record is maintained in Maxient, so if the student is in violation of one of these policies a second time, the case will be adjudicated with a finding of responsibility or not. There were 572 Informal Warning Letters sent.

** Additional Consequences/ Stipulations include but are not limited to individual meetings with the Director of Student Conduct, Hall Director, or university offices, assist with hanging of new decorations, maintain cleanliness in certain areas, complete roommate agreements, and suspension stipulations.

Reflection Papers

One of the consequences assigned to students in the conduct process is writing a reflection paper. All first-time alcohol and marijuana policy violations include the consequence of both an impact on self & community reflection paper, and an online alcohol and drug module reflection paper. Additionally, there are times when a student will be asked to write a reflection paper on topics including: how they would have handled the situation differently, how to address violations in the future, why certain items are not allowed in the residence halls, mindful decision making, and values assessment.

Every reflection paper is read by a member of the Office of Student Conduct staff. The impact on self & community paper submissions and the online alcohol and drug module reflection paper submissions are scored based on the learning outcomes associated with each paper. Students are provided guided questions to assist them in writing both the impact on self & community and online alcohol and drug module reflection papers.

Papers will be returned to the student for corrections if the length does not meet the criteria provided in their outcome letter.
