

The **FALL 2021** enrollment of **23,618** on the Springfield campus was the sixth highest headcount in Bear history.

For national comparison purposes, the headcount of **22,926** is used. It is based on IPEDS submissions and is represented on subsequent charts and tables. These data are used for all external surveys. This total does not include the **692** students exclusively auditing classes, enrolled at English Language Institute (ELI), China Campus or Study Away.

MSU's enrollment of **22,926** includes **13,729** females and **9,172** males.

18,838 (82.2%) Bears are undergraduate, while an additional **17.8%** are graduate students. undergraduate **82.2**%






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FIRST-TIME NEW IN COLLEGE UNDERGRADUATE BEARS TEST SCORES

Most (81.2%) first-time undergraduate Bears submitted ACT scores.




Average ACT Composite scores Our average ACT scores were **higher than** the state and national averages.



**Other Specialty Land of 1,250 acres is Bull Shoals Field Station and Baker Observatory. Physical changes continue on the Springfield campus:

- Completion of an approximate 10,800 square foot renovation of the first floor of the Plaster Student Union combined the previous
 Multicultural Resource Center (MRC) and
 Annex into one new centrally located, highly visible space with improved access to the student resources offered. The MRC includes staff offices, student gathering spaces, and flexible student spaces. The project also relocated the Office of Student Engagement to the northeast end of the first floor to accommodate staff offices, student organization offices and collaborative meeting space.
- MSU partnered with Springfield Public Schools (SPS) to construct a new 15,100 square foot building for the Springfield Public Schools Agricultural Magnet School. Located at the

William H. Darr Agricultural Center, the magnet school will provide more agricultural learning opportunities for K-12 students. The building includes classroom space, a greenhouse, garden and demonstration kitchen.

Construction of Building 4 of the Roy Blunt Jordan Valley Innovation Center (JVIC)

provided an additional 38,000 square feet of space for lease to JVIC tenants to support the continued growth of research programs. The addition is named the Brewer Science Innovation Annex, serves at the main entrance to JVIC and houses the Missouri Cybersecurity Center of Excellence.

The John Goodman Amphitheatre project provided Tent Theatre with an approximate 6.400 square foot, open air theatre with a permanent stage and fixed tiers for 331 removable seats. The structure is fitted with electrical and audio/video infrastructure to support equipment as needed for performances. The project includes an arts park, a place for students to gather and study, and a pavilion that can be used all year, not only for Tent Theatre productions, but for other university events and as outdoor classroom space. There were approximately 25,000 square feet of site improvements surrounding the amphitheatre including new storm water management, hardscapes, landscaping and lighting serving the new art park.
